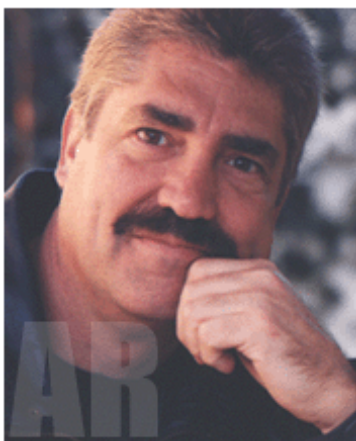
Lynnette Baum has brought several new ideas to the club, such as the "Will Write 4 Food" contest, the SCWA pens, and numerous other suggestions.

Publishers Weekly calls Alan Russell "one of the best writers in the mystery field today." He is certainly one of the most diverse writers in the mystery field. You never know what to expect from an Alan Russell novel other than a good read. His first two books, *No Sign of Murder* and *The Forest Prime Evil*, are classic whodunits, whereas his third and fourth novels, *The Hotel Detective* and *The Fat Innkeeper* are comedic mysteries. Alan's fifth and sixth novels, *Multiple Wounds* and *Shame*, are psychological thrillers. And, his most recent works, *Exposure* and *Political Suicide*, are both suspense novels.

When Alan Russell writes, he plays the 'what if' game: What if you were the son of a serial murderer and it suddenly appears to the world as

if you are repeating your father's sordid history? What if you are the holder of a grim secret with international consequences, but telling that secret implicates you in the death of an innocent? 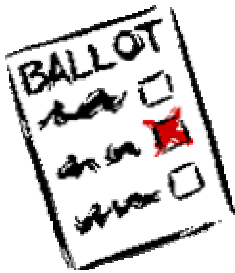

October Highlights:

“Prose That’s the Talk of the Town!” Featuring Speakers Brian Alan Lane & Reed Moran

It began with silence – a silence broken only by the monologue of a doomed man musing about past wonders and errors, in a voice shaken first with nostalgia, then with fear. The man was The Peacemaker. His doom was to witness the final cataclysmic destruction of earth.

During last month’s program, attendees at the Southern California Writers Association meeting sat spellbound, listening to Brian Alan Lane’s prose as produced for a new iPod production. With iPod prose as the talk of the town these days in Hollywood, no one could hear enough about how to write for the new wave of Mind Movies soon to flood the iPod industry.

“It’s wild and wacky stuff,” Lane said. “But, writing for iPods is not the future, it’s the present.”

Recommending Podcast Alley, iTunes and iToons as possible sources of revenue, Lane also suggested that TV Pay Per View episodes might soon become a new market for aspiring screenwriters.

“The whole point of podcasting is sharing,” Lane continued, “in a way not dissimilar to old radio broadcasting. You present the listener with a teaser, then build the story from there.

“Great writing is about great voices,” Lane stated. “What agents and

publishers respond to is a unique voice. This doesn’t come from laboring through classes or pounding away at a manuscript or trying to match what’s popular. It comes from who you are. Remember, great plots don’t sell. Great voices do!”

Then, Lane assigned the *ABC Love Story* to members, a homework assignment designed as a refiner’s fire for raw talent.

“In the *ABC Love Story*,” Lane explained, “each character is hopelessly in love with one other character who does not love them in return. Write this assignment quickly, and you will harvest your own authentic rhyme and melody.”

But, Lane’s wit was not the only source of inspiration for the listeners. Reed Moran, nationally acclaimed author, also shared valuable insights.

“Mood is the unconscious resonance of theme,” Moran said. “It’s not magic. The little elves don’t come down and create it during night. You must generate it by connecting with your characters. One never knows precisely how the words come together to express mood. But, through the filter of mood, we create authentic emotions that touch readers.”

Both speakers recommended an effective “trick” to connect with authentic emotions.

“At the start of a writing project, write down what you most want to write,” Moran stated. “Then, imagine that you can’t use it. This forces an awareness of scenes that we might be blind to, otherwise. And, remember, whether you’re writing an iPod script or a literary manuscript, what you feel matters. Trust it. Believe it. Lean on it. Because, feelings give writing a voice.”

Our minds had been instructed, our talent validated and our dreams motivated, when, to enthusiastic applause, Lane summed up the roots of his passion for iPod scripts.

“I write,” he said, “because it’s the only real thing I can do alone.”

A WRITER'S GIFT

An eighteen-year-old with only third-grade grammar skills; an elderly colonel whose project is how draught beer has strengthened countless nations during war; a woman who dresses in pill-box hats and Jacqueline Kennedy-style pastel suits and carries a little hat-box shaped purse with copies of her self-published "essential to women's literature" writings inside; and a man whose epic work is inhabited by ghosts of presidents-past that live in the Oval Office and who advised every new president on matters of national importance.

No, this isn't a remedial group at a psychiatric clinic.

Welcome to college, and to a popular class on "Novel Writing."

No matter your level of experience as an author, the desire to pen a novel has grown within you. You have ideas for a unique story. Your opening will hook readers faster than Marilyn nabbed men. The action you envision relegates "The Terminator" to a cure for insomnia. There's a romance with more drama than Scarlett and Rhett. And your ending will deliver sighs across the solar system.

And so you enroll in a college class on novel writing to test the waters. And because of your confidence, you seek early signs of approval for the great work of literature you are about to produce and bless them with.

They will remember you in that class for the ages. Your work will be an inspiration to a new generation of authors.

You submit your first chapter, which goes to each student. They take it home, and next week it will be a centerpiece of discussion, along with the

submissions of Archie and Leola.

The night of your debut approaches, and though you have been published in magazines, newspapers, on the web, and across five continents, there is a rising apprehension as the moment approaches for you to hear your fellow writers' critiques.

Archie's story of an attack from outer space by Day-Glo orange frogs is discussed first. It was a poorly written jumble of words with abysmal spelling and no character other than a hermaphrodite frog named LuBob. And the class raved. Complaints were minor.

And Kipper's tale of the ghost presidents is little better. But again, the class thought it was original and fresh.

Thirty pairs of eyes now focus on you.

Butterflies? Heck, it feels more like an army of vampire bats in your stomach.

And Dracula's Revenge begins.

"Your story has a clever set-up but . . ."

"How can you expect me to feel for a woman like . . ."

"I can't see how this will end . . ."

Your eyes widen, your ears burn, you betray no emotion.

But a small smile begins to sprout.

Your work was great, polished, professional--and you know it.

And so did your instructor, who states his reasons why.

And you realize the class bestowed upon you a precious gift.

It can't be taught. Or bought. Or passed on in the genes.

But it's a gift that redeems a writer's soul.

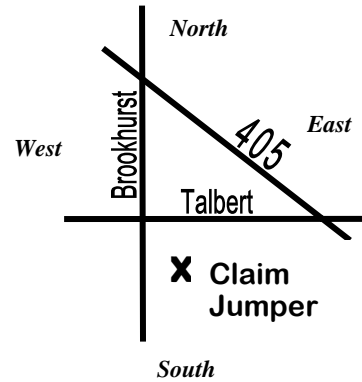
